TORI GRACE'S STORY

(as told by Sharon Paul and Lucy Betts)

Tori's Story begins on September 28, 2010 when she was rescued by our Humane Officer (Butch Morris). We don't know much about this beautiful 3-year old Tortoiseshell kitty's life before she entered the shelter, so we will tell her story (as we know it) on that date. Tori gave birth to three kittens the very day she came to the shelter, so her guardian angel must have been watching over her that day. Sadly, those kittens did not survive. This young mother was getting depressed and seemed to have lost her will to live. She guit eating and then developed an upper respiratory infection. It seemed that Tori's life might also have a sad ending. But it also seemed that Tori's guardian angel must have been continuing to watch over this special cat. Fate intervened since Butch believed this cat had survived for some good reason, and she was started on antibiotic treatment to save her life. Fate intervened again in a very different way when a tiny orphaned kitten was brought to the shelter and desperately needed a new mother. Tori was introduced to the kitten, and she raised that beautiful baby as her own and dearly loved her. Tori suddenly had a purpose in life and her spirit was lifted up. I named that kitten Orphan Annie, and I recall that I had given Tori her special name in memory of my maternal grandmother, Victoria, who was known as Tori. She was also a young mother who had lost infant children and actually died as a result of childbirth. I never had the privilege of knowing that beautiful lady.

We were extremely happy when a wonderful rescue group (*Three Sisters*) offered to take both Tori and Orphan Annie to safety. One of their foster mothers had been following Tori's story on our website and decided that she would like to offer

"I agreed to foster these kitties and was lucky to meet their transport from Marietta the week before Thanksgiving. What a blessing! I think I fell in love with them the minute I saw their sweet faces and gentle dispositions. The miracle kitties who had survived so much were safe. They would be adopted and loved forever.

Orphan Annie grew into an adorable and playful kitten. She has been adopted and lives in Boston now. She is simply called Annie these days and is loved by her forever family. Annie was so much fun to foster and play with, and I remember how she loved those toy mice!

Tori, too, has been adopted. Once she came into my home, I knew that she would stay with me forever. Her name is now Tori Grace. She is here because of the grace of God and the kindness and caring of so many people. She is truly a miracle, and I treasure her every day. Tori Grace is the cat who purrs and purrs. Whenever she sees a person, she begins to purr. I think she knows how lucky and special she is. The wonderment of a shelter cat exploring her new world! Today she discovered a new scratching toy. She discovered cat treats the other day. She's still not sure she likes catnip like the other kitties, but she's working on it. I love to watch her look at the squirrels and birds in the tree outside the window. That's her favorite place to sit. She is the most loving cat!

This is a testimony about the kindness of many people who each did their part for these cats and their survival. This is a story of miracles. It is about the best of rescue work and mankind. The story of Tori Grace and Orphan Annie illustrates the true meaning of faith, giving and love. To everyone at the HSOV and Three Sisters, I send much gratitude and thanks."



AN INTERVIEW WITH A SHELTER DOG

By "Clifford" (The Little Red Dog) as told to Sharon Paul

I'll admit that when I was asked to do an interview about my life at the shelter, I was flattered. After all, I was merely a stray dog and probably nothing special in the eyes of most people. But it seemed that someone wanted to hear my story, and that made me feel pretty special in itself.

My story begins on September 9, 2010 when I was abandoned during the late night or early morning hours and placed in an outside kennel. I don't remember anything about the person who put me in their car and took me for a ride. The lady who interviewed me said I had probably blocked that bad experience from my memory. Anyway, I sat there alone until daylight wondering where on earth I might be. I had looked out the windows during my car ride to see if there were any familiar landmarks, but it was too dark for me to see much. At daybreak my ears perked up when I heard cars pulling into the parking lot, and I thought maybe my

owner had come looking for me. Instead there were some pretty nice folks who came over to where I was sitting and asked where I had come from. Later on I learned their names were Rachel, Barry, Kory, and Jake. They took me inside and told me that I was at a place called the Humane Society of the Ohio Valley, and they were going to take good care of me. That sounded good but I wasn't exactly sure I could trust them after my experience the night before.

I had to wait in a small room called Intake/Receiving for a short time while my paperwork was completed, and I was trembling and pretty scared. The folks I met in the parking lot looked at my teeth and decided I was around 6 months old. My breed was listed as Pit Bull Terrier mix and it was noted that I had a reddish/auburn coat. Then I was led to a kennel in another area of the shelter called Holding #2. Shortly after my arrival, Kory brought me a nice blanket, a bowl of water, and a big bowl of food. But I was too nervous to eat just yet. Later that day, Rachel said I had to get my vaccinations and bordetella vaccine and took me back to that Intake area. From that day forward, I affectionately called her "Nurse Rachel" and knew she would take good care of me. I remember that Barry said I needed to get weighed, and I was

surprised when I stepped on those big scales and saw that I actually weighed 37 lbs.

The next three days were spent in the same Holding #2 kennel, and I learned that all stray dogs normally spend several days there since we are kept three days to see if our

owner comes to reclaim us. After three days, we can be adopted out and go to another home if we are lucky.

But nobody came looking for me, and I was moved to another location called Main Kennel. I was overwhelmed when I walked into that huge room since I had never seen so many dogs in one place in all of my young life. It was awfully noisy since everyone was talking (i.e., barking) at the same time and vying for attention. I remember thinking it was going to be difficult to get a good night's sleep with all that noise \odot

That first night back in Main Kennel, I was amazed at how quiet

it was after the shelter staff and volunteers went home for the day around 5 o'clock. Some of my new friends asked polite questions about how I happened to end up in the "Hotel For Dogs" and wanted to know what my name was. I was embarrassed to say that I was left in an outside pen overnight, and that I didn't really have a name. One by one they began to tell me not to feel bad since the only dogs who really had a name when they came into the shelter were the ones who had been surrendered by their owners. Then they asked if I had my pictures taken yet, which I thought was really a strange thing to ask since I'd sure never been in front of a camera. They teased me for a short time before explaining that there was a volunteer who came to the shelter almost every day to take glamour photos of the new animals for their kennel cards, but mainly to put them on something called the HSOV website and facebook.

Sure enough the following day a rather petite woman with a very large camera stopped by my kennel and asked if I'd like to take a little walk outside and have my picture taken. When I looked up at her, she smiled and said I was sooo cute and that I had the prettiest eyes. She said that she loved my



one blue eye and my cross-eyed appearance. That was a surprise to me since I'd never seen myself in the mirror and nobody had ever told me that I was cute. She tied a bright blue bandana around my neck, and we took a little walk outside before she took my pictures. When we came back inside, she actually sat in the kennel with me and told me again what a good dog I was. And I felt really special when she whispered in my ear that she had thought of a perfect name for me. I was going to be called "Clifford" (Our Little Red Dog). I was so anxious to tell my new friends about my name later that night when the Main Kennel quieted down!

The evenings were when we talked to each other about our previous lives and how we yearned to have a real home with someone to love us. It was sad to hear someone down the row of kennels crying as they told us how they remembered having a home, then a new baby came into the household, their owner had become ill, they were no longer a cute puppy, etc. I remember one dog saying he had been abused in his previous home, and this was the best home he had ever known since there were people who were good to him and he had a nice bed and good food. It helped us to talk to each other, and to remind ourselves that we had done nothing wrong.

Our living quarters in the Main Kennel were long narrow kennels with concrete walls between them and a metal gate on the front, so the only other dogs we could actually see were the ones directly in front of our own kennel. The smaller dogs had to sit in metal cages which were dubbed "Beagle Row", so I was thankful I was in a kennel with a run where I could stretch my legs.

Those first few days at the shelter were pretty frightening for me, but I soon settled into the daily routine. Around 8-8:30am the kennel techs came to work, and I looked forward to spending a few hours

outdoors in the fresh air while they were cleaning our kennels. This might be a good place to mention that it was especially difficult for the dogs who were housetrained since they had no choice but to "go to the bathroom" in their kennel overnight. They would feel ashamed because they soiled their living quarters, and we would all tell them it wasn't their fault.

I looked forward to the noon hour each day since that is when the shelter officially opened, and there would be volunteers and visitors walking through the Main Kennel throughout the day. Almost everyone would stop by and give each of us a pat on the head and give us dog treats, and many would actually take us outside for a long walk. And of course, there was always the chance that one of them might

fall in love with me and adopt me ③

I also looked forward to 3 o'clock in the afternoon, because that's when I would hear the dinner trolley being pushed through the Main Kennel. I guess I was a little naïve during that first week or so when I remarked that the kennel techs really did a nice job of preparing our meals and varying the menu. I learned later that the unique blend which was served each day was based upon the dog food that had been donated. But it still tasted good to me!

Around mid-September, there was some added excitement as we heard that several of us might get to spend a morning in downtown Marietta at an event called "The Paws Walk". I didn't have much hope of being chosen, but to my surprise the lady who had taken my pictures obviously had fallen in love with me and told me I would be attending as one of the shelter's "Goodwill Ambassadors". Bright and early on the morning of September 19th I made my debut in Muskingum Park where I was told I was a real crowd pleaser. One nice lady named Lisa really oohed and aahed over me and said she wished she could adopt me. It was a bit of a letdown to come back to the shelter after all that excitement and the long walk down Front Street, but I figured it would only be

a matter of time until somebody came to the shelter and asked specifically for "Clifford "(The Little Red Dog). And I waited and waited...

I was always happy when I saw another dog being adopted, but I have to admit that it made me feel sorry for myself and wish that it were me leaving with a nice family instead. I heard that if you weren't lucky enough to be adopted, there was a red-haired lady named Celeste who could find something called a Rescue who would help. It was always a hopeful sign when one of us had our pictures forwarded to Celeste

and many of my new friends went on something called Transport while I was at the shelter.

Around mid-November, when I least expected it, I was told that a lady in Michigan had fallen in love with my photographs on the website and wanted to adopt me! My dream of a real home with someone to love me quickly became a reality, and I made the long journey to Michigan a few days later. My new mistress says she loved me even more when she met me in person than she did when she saw my photographs, and it was love at first sight for me when I saw her too © But I'll always have a soft spot in my heart for all of the nice folks at the Humane Society of the Ohio Valley for having faith in me and for taking such good care of me.



IN MEMORY OF "MAJORETTE"

Majorette was a lovely oneyear old Maine Coon mix kitty who had such a delightful personality. Though she wasn't wearing white boots when we took her glamour photos, she immediately started "marking time" and marching in place as though she were ready to



lead the parade. Majorette seemed to be all things wonderful wrapped up in a small package. She was playful, lovable, purred on contact, rolled over on her back for attention, head-butted, and loved to have her ears rubbed.

Majorette was at the HSOV for nearly two months waiting for someone to fall in love with her, but sadly that did not happen. This beautiful girl and 979 other adorable cats/kittens were euthanized during the period January-December 2010.

It is heartbreaking to look at Majorette's photos and remember her personality and to realize that she lost her life because so many animals have not been spayed or neutered and continue to have litters of unwanted kittens.

Occasionally we have animals which need extra TLC or medication. Or perhaps a pregnant-or nursing mother needs a temporary place to raise her family before they are adopted. Another situation might be that the shelter is filled to capacity and you could temporarily foster an animal to prevent it from being euthanized simply because it has been at the shelter too long.

Fostering is a very rewarding experience knowing that you have made a difference in the life of that one dog or cat that you've cared for in your home. This is a wonderful way to help a shelter animal and doesn't require a long-term commitment on your part. (Kind of like spoiling the grandchildren and then sending them home).

If you would like to talk with some of our foster parents about their experiences, we have several individuals who are enthusiastic about fostering and love to talk about the dogs and cats that they have helped. Or if you already feel that you would like to become part of our **Foster Program** by opening up your home and your heart to a shelter animal, we encourage you to complete our "Foster Program Application Form" which is available on our website (www.hsov.org).

NEW ADOPTION FEES FOR OUR SHELTER CATS/KITTENS

The HSOV is offering a reduced adoption rate of \$25 for all cats and kittens in hopes that we can find homes for as many of them as possible. This adoption fee includes a \$20 spay/neuter voucher which will be honored by local veterinarians. The adoption fee will be only \$5 if the cat has already been spayed or neutered. You will be required to submit an adoption application for approval before adopting an animal (which is our normal procedure). Adoption application forms are available on our website. Please check our website (www. hsov.org) as well as our facebook group/fan pages to view photos of our many beautiful cats and kittens. Or better yet .. stop by the shelter and meet them in person!

SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM FOR A SHELTER DOG OR CAT

We are currently working on a new Sponsorship Program whereby individuals could sponsor a shelter dog or cat in order to increase its chances of being adopted. Perhaps you've fallen in love with a special animal at the shelter and cannot adopt him/her into your own home but would still like to help that dog/puppy or cat/kitten find a good home. By sponsoring the cost of spaying/neutering, the adoption fee for that animal would be more reasonable. Or you might want to sponsor vetting, such as feline leukemia/FIV combo testing, for a cat in order to increase its chances of being adopted or rescued. We hope to have more detailed information in the July newsletter but wanted to include a preliminary announcement in this newsletter.
